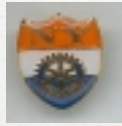

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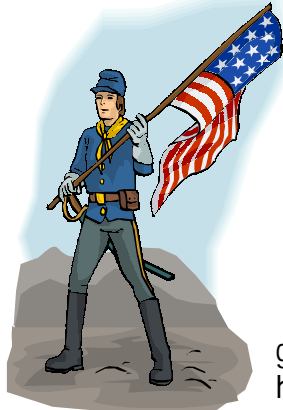

Lieutenant Commander Steven V. Brock United States Navy

Lieutenant Commander Steven V. Brock, born in Hudson, Ohio. His father was a Rotarian. Upon graduation from the United States Naval Academy in 1990, he was commissioned as an ensign in the United States Navy. As part of Carrier Airwing Nine, he was deployed aboard the USS Nimitz (CVB-68) in 1992 and 1993. During these deployments Lieutenant Commander Brock served as the Nimitz strike plot watch officer, and as a Carrier Airwing Nine mission briefer and debriefer.

In 1994, Lt. Comdr. Brock was assigned to the NATO combined Air Operations Center, in Vicenza, Italy, as an indication & warning watch officer for operations deny flight and provide promise. Commander's threat briefer for humanitarian air- drop missions in UN declared safe areas throughout Bosnia-Herzegovina and air-land missions to Sarajevo.

From 1995 to 1998, Lt. Comdr. Brock was assigned to the Office of Naval Intelligence in Washington, D.C. Lt. Comdr. Brock represented ONI at the DCI's Nonproliferation Imagery Working Group and the intelligence community's global integrated intelligence requirements reviews.

In the fall of 1998, Lt. Comdr. Brock was deployed to Commander U.S. sixth fleet to provide national level intelligence support for NATO contingency planning in Kosovo. Lieutenant Commander Brock currently serves at the United States Mission to the United Nations as the US Navy representative to the Military Staff Committee. As a JCS J5 liaison, Lt. Comdr. Brock advises the US Permanent Representative to the UN and his staff on JCS/OSD peacekeeping and related military equities in Europe, the Middle East, and the Americas. Additionally, Lt. Comdr. Brock manages the US government's intelligence sharing program with the UN.

A distinguished graduate of the Georgetown University School of Foreign Service, Lt. Comdr. Brock holds a Master of Arts degree in national security studies. He also holds a Bachelor of Science in marine engineering with merit from the United States Naval Academy in Annapolis, Maryland.

I am fully aware of the classification system and know that the Club has been "creative" about classification since I joined in 1973.

My classification is Civil Law-Patent Law, and despite this classification, without any objection on my part, there are at least two additional patent lawyers as members in good standing of this Club. I was admitted to the Club, despite the membership of Al Nolte, Jr., who then had the Civil Law-Patent Law classification.

I believe Rotary is a place for Service-Above-Self. Since we are all individually different, qualified members should not be rejected on class alone.

Service-Above-Self deems that Rotarians be able to serve the different needs of different people. I would hope that a proposed member, rejected on classification, would be reviewed by a vote of the membership rather than being rejected by a committee action.

While this is my personal feeling, particularly as the Chairman of the Process Improvement Task Force, I note that Richard King, the incoming President of Rotary International, seems to have espoused views similar to this, at the honorary dinner for him at the Yale Club recently.
