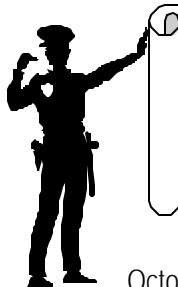

★ POLICEMAN RECOGNITION DAY



First Deputy Commissioner Joseph P. Dunne was appointed to the New York City Police Department in October 1969. He began his career patrolling the streets of Brooklyn's 75th precinct. Eight years later, in October of 1977, he was promoted to Sergeant - the beginning of a steady rise through the ranks. The year 1994 accelerated his advancement toward the department's highest levels, beginning with his promotion to full Inspector in October of that year. He was promoted in each of the following two years, first to Deputy Chief in August 1995, and then to Assistant Chief in June of 1996. In December 1997, he was designated Chief of the Housing Bureau. He was sworn in as Chief of Department on July 10, 1999.

First Deputy Commissioner Dunne's vast experience includes serving in the Patrol Bureau, Organized Crime Control Bureau, Detective Bureau, Personnel Bureau, Patrol Borough Brooklyn North and the Internal Affairs Bureau. He has been the Commanding Officer of the 75th and 81st precincts as well as the Executive Officer of the 81st precinct.

One of First Deputy Commissioner Dunne's most successful accomplishments was the creation and implementation of the Strategic and Tactical Command (S.A.T.-COM) Brooklyn North concept, which accomplished the redesign of several traditionally separate command jurisdictions into a single cohesive structure.

In his next assignment, as Chief of the Housing Bureau, First Deputy Commissioner Dunne was responsible for the delivery and coordination of police services to the more than 600,000 residents of public housing throughout the city, managing a force of over 1,400 uniformed Police Officers.

As Chief of the department, First Deputy Commissioner Dunne was the highest-ranking uniformed member of the New York City Police Department in command of the five enforcement Bureaus – Patrol Services, Detective, Organized Crime Control, Housing and Transit. He coordinated the crime-control strategy known as "Compstat", which analyzes crime incidents via computerized statistics.

Appointed to his current title in August 21, 2000, First Deputy Commissioner Dunne now serves as the Chief Executive Assistant and advisor to the Police Commissioner. The First Deputy Commissioner assumes the duties and responsibilities of the Police Commissioner in his absence, and administers budgetary management and personnel functions of the Department. Additionally, First Deputy Commissioner Dunne supervises the discipline system, represents the Department in labor negotiations and advises all commanders on existing labor contract administration.

First Deputy Commissioner Dunne holds a Bachelor of Arts degree in political science from St. Francis College, and was awarded an honorary doctorate in civil law from St. Francis College. He is a 1994 graduate of the Columbia University Police Management Institute.

OPENING REMARKS AT THE GALA DINNER IN HONOR OF RICHARD D. KING

Dear President-Elect King:

Our 92-year-old Club is proud of your visit with us and pledges its full support to your year of presidency of Rotary International. We compare our deeds to RI with those of the Founding Fathers to our country. Begun in 1909, the Rotary pin, the banner, and Rotary International's Constitution originated from the RCNY.

Today, we have expanded the Rotary Avenues of Service to eight divisions within which 64 committees are working tirelessly.

Our past laurels invigorate us in present service. Our membership is progressively increasing. Our Foundation is aiming at two million to four million in capital in the next three years.

We have made a firm commitment for financial assistance and start-up support for Rotary clubs in HCMC and Hanoi, and it is our desire to work cooperatively with District 3350 and RI headquarters to achieve the objective of Reestablishing Rotary in Vietnam. We have submitted a \$50,000 matching grant application for which we raised \$29,000 jointly with Districts 2030 (Italy) and 2241 (Rumania) for an orphanage for abandoned children in Rumania. Our honorary President Shigemi Morita, a trustee of our District, is the international chair of the Children at Risk task force. He, together with immediate Past President Ed Gray spearheaded this project. Mr. Morita just raised another \$25,000 for the children of Mongolia. Currently, he is working on funding the Rotaract project for local needy children. Our foundation, among numerous charities, just founded a \$50,000 electronic learning center in Spanish Harlem.

Please be assured that with RCNY President-Elect Helen Reisler, and with RI President-Elect King, we will have a club of which to be proud of.

Amateurism -The Threatening Danger of Our Modern Life By Leo V. Fromm

How often do we experience service that is not at all sufficient, or work that is not at all satisfying?

People praise themselves as specialists with great experience, promising high quality and punctuality in their work. Besides that, they are often very demanding in their prices, too.

But what's the reality? Frankly said, in many cases we would feel tempted to say: What a bungle! How unreliable!

Isn't it a symptom of our times that we have to face more and more such disappointments? There are different reasons for this. Young people today, might not be systematically educated in their profession. Perhaps they might not be interested in completing their professional knowledge and experiences during the later years of their lives.

Many people consider their jobs merely as vehicles with which to make money. They seem to be missing the challenge of a true profession.

Therefore, it is becoming more and more difficult to rely on the promises of quality, on-time work and services.

I think it's necessary to try to increase the working morale by the radiating power of a good example. It should also become much more visible that a profession one loves could give a deeper sense to this so essential part of life -- that enjoying one's work enables one to have a better career, and to make more money.

All in all, only strong and permanent efforts to conquer amateurism could reduce this drawback to modern life.
